TRUST CELEBRATES 20 AMAZING YEARS



The Charity Hospital now has seven buildings in Harewood Road with proposed plans to open a training and education facility.

The 20th anniversary of the Canterbury Charity Hospital Trust is this year.

No one could have imagined quite how successful a new community hospital staffed by volunteers would have become. The vision of the trusts founders has been made a reality by the good will and dedication of the community it has gone on to serve.

The reasons for its being, have sadly not gone away. That being the inadequacies of the public health system to provide basic elective care to those unable to access it.

In many specialties things have got even worse, for example women's health, endoscopy and dermatology to name but a few.

Fortunately, many of these services can now be offered by the charity's increased number of specialties from the modern facilities that have grown over the last two decades.

The next 20 years

One service that was not available when the hospital started has become essential and lifesaving for many. That area is endoscopy. The hospital team sees a large number of patients declined by NZ Health and sadly discovers more patients with cancer and abnormalities in increasingly younger people.

The trust has been looking at ways to deal with this problem longer term and believes part of the problem can be helped by increasing the number and types of health professionals who can undertake investigations.

To this end, and to also support additional clinical education, "The trust hopes develop a training and education facility next to the hospital in Harewood Road," says executive officer Carl Shaw.

As a true community charity, such a facility will also be available for other community groups who provide free services.

"Over the years it has become clear that clinical research and education at the hospital has served to bring in even greater numbers of volunteers and this new venture is expected to help further in this regard."

WHO WE HELP

Patients seen at the hospital need a referral from their family doctor or dentist. They must also have been turned down by the public health system, not be covered by ACC and not have medical insurance. They must not have the funds to pay for their treatment privately.

The hospital's day services and treatments are regularly updated, depending on demand and volunteers services and currently includes colonoscopy; gynaecology and women's health; general day surgery; oral surgery and dentistry; orthopaedics; cataracts; dermatology; dietetics and urology.

LOCALS LUCKY TO HAVE **CHARITY HOSPITAL**

Canterbury and the West Coast communities are very lucky to have a charity hospital where they can access free services that are not provided through the public health system.

The Charity Hospital has grown substantially in less than 20 years to become an integral and essential provider of free health services to the region's community.

The Charity Hospital does not receive any Government support and is staffed mostly by volunteers, with doctors, nurses and administration staff providing their skills for free. Their generosity in donating their time means that the hospital's services continue to be free.

Around \$1 million in operating costs is still needed and they rely on donations, bequests and grants to raise this amount. Of every dollar donated to the hospital, 82 cents go directly to patient care.
